Terrestrial Burrow Supplies

Introduction

This How-To will take you through the steps involved in assembling a simple and safe habitat for terrestrial and opportunistic burrowing species. These components used have been carefully selected to provide the best environment for your pet. This method has worked successfully with over 150 different species.

Supply List

1. Critter Keeper (Medium to Large)
2. Burrow (Large Deli Cup 6" to 8" Tall)
3. Water Dish (Small Deli Cup)
4. Peat Moss (1 to 2 lbs.)



Preparation

- Inspect for damage. If any of the items are cracked or broken, be sure to replace it prior to beginning. If anything is damaged, it could harm your pet.
- Clean the cage carefully. Be sure to not use any harsh chemicals, as this could harm your pet and damage the cage. Wash with warm soapy water, and dry with a clean soft towel.
- Make sure the burrow and water dish are also clean.
- We strongly recommend removing the handle from the top of the cage. If this handle is used to carry the cage, it could come off and the cage might be dropped, disturbing or harming your pet.

1. Add Peat Moss

Place the peat moss in a mound at one end of the cage (Figure 1). This will allow you to put the burrow into the bottom of the cage without the peat moss getting in the way. Peat moss works great as a substrate in the cage because it packs down well and allows your tarantula to burrow in it if they so desire. It is light enough that if a cave-in does occur; the tarantula could dig out.

NOTE: Make sure to not use peat moss that has pesticides added. Read the label carefully.

2. Insert Burrow

Insert the burrow, a large deli cup, into the cage. When you do this, be sure to scoop some of the peat moss into the cup as you insert it (Figure 2). This will create a flat floor in the bottom of the burrow. Leave a small amount of peat moss under the burrow, and leave some space behind the burrow.

3. Cover Burrow

Cover the burrow with the peat moss (Figure 3). Be sure to backfill all around the burrow (Figure 4). This style of burrow gives your tarantula a safe hiding place where you can still see it. Pack the peat moss down around the burrow to secure it. Be sure not to crush the burrow when packing down the peat moss.

4. Insert Water Dish

Insert the water dish above the burrow as shown (Figure 5). Be sure to pack some peat moss around the dish in order to secure it. The dish needs to be level & stable so the tarantula can not tip the dish over.

5. Finishing Up

In finishing up you need to add water to the dish. You will also need to spray some water onto the peat moss before putting your tarantula into the cage. Place your tarantula in its new home (Figure 6). It is usually best to leave your pet alone for a while after putting it in a new home so they can get used to it and be comfortable.

Maintenance

This new habitat for your tarantula should provide all the space necessary for a healthy existence. This new habitat will be easy to maintain. You should remove any foreign matter and leftovers from the cage when you feed your tarantula. You should regularly inspect the health of your pet and the safety of its environment. If anything is out of the ordinary please ask for help from a qualified individual. About every 6 to 9 months you should completely clean out the cage. This includes adding new peat moss, and replacing the water dish and burrow.
